Sir,-

With reference to your application for the admission to Canada of Mrs. Brocha Pomerantz, aged 30, widow, together with her four children, Yosek, aged nine, Yetta, aged seven, Abraham, aged two, and Sam, infant, aged six months, all of whom are at present residing at 13 Nova St. Sokov, Poland, on the understanding that you are to marry Mrs. Pomerantz the sum of \$500.00 having been deposited with the Department as a guarantee that the marriage will take place at the port of arrival before Mrs. Pomerantz is released by the Immigration Authorities, I would inform you that the settlement arrangements are accepted as satisfactory. I will be necessary, however, for the above mentioned persons to be in good health, physically and mentally and in possession of a valid passport bearing the visa of a Canadian Immigration Officer stationed on the continent of Europe, Mrs. Pomerantz will further be required to pass the literacy test and be of good character.

This letter is only valid for five months from the date of same and must be presented within such period by the proposed immigrants to the Canadian Immigration Inspector by whom said immigrants are examined before leaving Europe and from whom visa is to be obtained; also to the Canadian Immigration Officer at the port of arrival in Canada where the letter will be lifted by the latter official and returned to the Department.
